Each Advent, especially this one, many of us enter a period of particular anxiety. If we are blessed with friends and family we wonder how we can celebrate together safely and worry that whatever we do will not be enough. If we are alone by fate or choice we wonder how we are going to survive all those picture-perfect Hallmark greeting card-moments that do not include us. This year, I expect all of us, at one time or another, will search our hearts and social media outlets for ways to inhabit the holiday that do not presuppose a traditional intergenerational family gathering.

If we are poor the fact is that, whether we are surrounded by family or alone, we feel the acute and gnawing anxiety of the hungry and wonder whether we'll have food and shelter for the night let alone a piece of pumpkin pie and a seat at the table.

Whoever we are, whatever our circumstances, one thing is sure – we are slaves to Maslow's famous hierarchy; we're all needy in one way or another this time of year and we're all looking for someone or something to meet our needs, fill us up, and make us whole.

In Advent, we followers of the Way are charged to wait patiently, to stay alert, and to discipline ourselves to resist the cultural pull to begin our Christmas celebration the day after Thanksgiving, if not before. We know that there is grace is waiting for Jesus, for reflecting upon what God's audacious act of revealing God's self to us as a vulnerable human baby means to us, personally and collectively —and what his divinely human birth tells us about the Kingdom of God.

As we negotiate our lives through Advent, trying to wait and reflect, look, listen, and stay awake, may we not forget that the miracle we await is already here. As we anxiously anticipate the new hope that each Christmas brings, remember that our Lord Christ is with us now – that we can experience him at this very moment in the face of our best friend, biggest enemy, or total stranger. We've all heard the phrase "This is our new normal." For some, it means more than having to wear a face mask or limiting contact with others. For our Food Pantry neighbors it means lost jobs, the inability to pay the mortgage or rent or simply not having enough to eat. In fact because of the lack of federal relief, unemployment and furloughs many more Lake and Geauga County residents are faced with this "new normal" and are food insecure.

Thanks to all our St. Andrew volunteers, the folks at Advent Lutheran and your monetary support, we've been able to continue to provide four food pantry distributions per month. Most of the food we distribute is purchased (or donated) from the Cleveland Food Bank. While we usually are able to keep non-perishables and frozen meat stocked, we do not have personal items like soap, shampoo, hand lotion, toothpaste and deodorant.

Imagine not having soap or shampoo to keep yourself clean. It's a struggle that our Food Pantry neighbors face all the time. These are items that cannot be purchased with food stamps. Share the love this season by donating personal care products that will benefit our Food Pantry neighbors. We need items like kleenex, shampoo, hand soap, body wash, toilet paper, deodorant and laundry detergent. The St. Andrew giving tree will be in the Narthex through December 25th.
