Epiphany

Origin: Middle English from the Greek epiphainein meaning 'reveal' or 'manifest.' Meaning: The manifestation of Christ to the Gentiles as represented by the Magi (Matthew 2:1-12) The wise ones, those seekers who studied the connections of earth and heaven followed a star from the east. They were convinced that it would lead them to the King of the Jews whom they would worship. Prophesy foretold his coming (see: Micah 5:2). The wise ones, who observed, investigated, and believed things seen and unseen followed the star into unknown places. They avoided distractions along the way, and basked in the Light of Christ, a light for all people.

Jesus, once encountered, transformed the wise ones in ways they (and we) could not imagine. We know that their meeting with Jesus, processed through the medium of dream, prompted them to find their way home by a new way, so as to avoid a further encounter with King Herod. Herod, as we know from biblical account, hoped to discover Jesus' location from the wise ones so that Herod could kill Jesus. To Herod, Jesus was a political threat who might, by his very existence, usurp Herod's power base. To the wise ones, Jesus transcended the machinations of worldly kings. By their journey the wise ones discovered that Jesus was the Light of the World, one whose light shone across geographic, tribal, and religious divides to reconcile all things on heaven and on earth.

The Diocese of Ohio is hosting a Winter Convocation for Episcopalians from the Diocese of Ohio to gather, learn, share ideas and worship together. The theme for this year's event is "We're Trying." It will take place at Kalahari Resort and Convention Center in Sandusky from 7:00 p.m. on Friday, February 7th through 3:00 p.m. on Saturday, February 8th. The keynote speaker The Rev. Lorenzo Librija, Director of TryTank. TryTank is an experimental laboratory for church growth and innovation. Hear from Rev. Librija about experiments (even the ones that failed!) conducted and what we as a church are learning. Other workshops include sessions on Discerning New Ministry through our Neighbor's Eyes, Stewardship and The Language of Prayer. With 13 workshops, a children's program, and a youth program, the Winter Convocation offers something for everyone. Individual registration is just \$29 through January 17th.
