From the Rector

If I speak in the tongues of mortals and of angels, but do not have love, I am a noisy gong or a clanging cymbal. And if I have prophetic powers, and understand all mysteries and all knowledge, and if I have all faith, so as to remove mountains, but do not have love, I am nothing. If I give away all my possessions, and if I have over my body so that I may boast, but do not have love, I gain nothing.

Love is patient; love is kind; love is not envious or boastful or arrogant or rude. It does not insist on its own way; it is not irritable or resentful; it does not rejoice in wrongdoing, but rejoices in the truth. It bears all things, believes all things, hopes all things, endures all things.

Love never ends. But as for prophecies, they will come to an end; as for tongues, they will cease; as for knowledge, it will come to an end. For we know only in part, and we prophesy only in part; but when the complete comes, the partial will come to an end. When I was a child, I spoke like a child, I thought like a child, I reasoned like a child; when I became an adult, I put an end to childish ways. For now we see in a mirror, dimly, but then we will see face to face. Now I know only in part; then I will know fully, even as I have been fully known. And now faith, hope, and love abide, these three; and the greatest of these is love. -1 Corinthians 13

Are there any more inspiring and affirming words than these for those who seek to live through times of trouble in Christ? I included the entire chapter here because I needed to hear these words today and expect that you do too. Although social isolation continues to be required of us in order to keep each other safe, community is what sustains us. It's a quandary that we meet as best with can with patience, prayer, and love.

Every Monday holiday throughout the year, a group of St. Andrew volunteers prepare a meal for St. James Lunch program. The program, at St. James in Painesville, feeds



Sacred Ground is coming to St. Andrew

Sacred Ground is an Episcopal Church created film-documentary and readings based dialogue series on race designed for small groups. It is a part of the "Becoming Beloved Community" initiative in our church. Through the series, participants take a walk through history and explore together how our personal family histories as largely European Americans intersect with the family histories of people of color-Indigenous, Black, Latino, and Asian/Pacific American histories. Through the series, which by all accounts is both challenging and engaging, we are invited to "peel away the layers that have that have contributed to the challenges and divides of the present day – all while grounded in our call to faith, hope and love."

We'll begin the 10 part series together, watching the documentaries and pursuing the readings individually, then coming together weekly over the course of the spring (via zoom) to share our thoughts, impressions, questions, responses, and learning edges. There will be no judgment or shaming here-just an opportunity to learn from our past, gain insights together about our present, and move forward into a future defined by our faith, as manifested in our beloved community.

We will begin the series together during the week of Ash Wednesday (February 17) and continue for 10 weeks. Watch for information about series access and zoom meet-ups. 


