From the Rector

Conrad Galayda is a parish leader and a blessing. I know I am preaching to the choir in making this statement-anyone who has encountered Conrad in and around the parish has experienced his kindness and can-do attitude. He's always ready to lead or to follow in our parish adventures as the occasion demands. Conrad pays attention to the needs of others and is a ready source of encouragement to me and to many as we seek to follow the Way of Jesus. Recently, Conrad led us toward parish epiphany and collective wisdom by sharing a story about how racism has touched his life. I offer it here in thanksgiving for Conrad. His open-hearted honesty in sharing his story will surely lead others (hint, hint) to share their stories during the month of August. When you choose to share your personal story about racism and privilege, you invite others to learn from you and through you. Learning together by the honest sharing of our experiences helps us gain the insights we need to meet our baptismal covenant to "seek justice and peace among all people, and respect the dignity of every human being." BCP 305. Here's Conrad's story:

We have been charged by our Rector, Rev. Lisa O'Rear, to write our story as it relates to our views and experiences with racism. Most of us realize there needs to be changes. Where do start, how do we start, what do we do? It starts with looking within, to do some self-examination. What will be revealed. Hopefully, we will see growth from then to now. Or, it will show that we are the same. Either way, it can direct us to change and grow in our daily interactions and lead to acceptance of all as children of God thus to be loved without exception.

I was born, grew up and continue to live in Painesville, Ohio. I had 2 parents, a nice house, clean clothes, food on the table and never really wanted for much. My mom was a working mother but it was at her mother's restaurant. The reality was that day-care was not needed. We came to the restaurant after school and hung out either in the dining room or upstairs with Grandma and Aunt Lena. I went to St. Mary's School for 8 years, Cathedral Latin School for 4 years. St. Mary's because my dad, being Lutheran, had signed the agreement to raise his kids Catholic in order to marry my in the church (a different bone of contention, which really didn't happen because at that time, if your partner was not Catholic, you were married in the rectory). I spent another 4 years in a Catholic school that was my choice. In retrospect, I came to realize my choice had a lot to do with sibling issues (once again, another bone of contention).

Survey Says...

By now many of you have responded to the *St. Andrew Return to Church Survey* that was sent last month. 37 replies were received. The results reflect what most of the country is experiencing at the moment - a desire to return to normal, mixed with an abundance of caution. The survey revealed that many who replied (60%) are not ready to rush back to church and are in favor of a cautious return plan.

Over half who completed the survey (54%) would consider attending an outdoor service, Sundays at 10:30 AM. The other half of those responding to that question were almost evenly split between "No" and "Unsure" about attending an outdoor service with safety restrictions. When guestioned about the best time to return to in-person worship the top answers (67%) were "when social distancing is lifted," "when a vaccine is available," and "All of the above." We thank everyone who responded. Your input will help guide the Vestry in determining when a return to inperson worship will happen. The conversation will continue at the August 16th Coffee Hour at St. Andrew on the front lawn.

Looking Forward to Harvest

Yes, we are looking forward to this year's harvest, but in some ways we have been harvesting all season long!








We need you... Garden Advisory Committee



We were not wealthy or well-to-do by any means. I can't tell you what financial issues there were because they were never discussed when I was around. When I asked to go to a private school that would cost money as opposed to the free public high school, their answer was an immediate yes.

I started working for money at 16 (working for family was expected and was free labor) as was expected by my parents. I also wanted a pair of loafers that my dad said I would have to buy for myself. This concludes a brief overview of my life from birth to age 18.

Growing up in Painesville for me was idyllic. We played outside until the street lights came on, my mom knew what I had done before I came home, and she was at home. There was not an area of Painesville that I was afraid to walk in. Walking or biking was the way we got around. I knew where the African-American and the Puerto Rican/Hispanic people lived. I didn't think about that, I was just on my way through. They were just there. JUST THERE has become the crux of my white privilege upbringing. I don't recall my mom or dad using any racial slurs during my growing years but I know a lot of my aunts and uncles did. So, why my indifference? I think because they were JUST THERE. In sight but out of mind. All I had to do was acknowledge their existence with a smile, wave or just 'hello' which I did not. Maybe and probably, contrary to what I said earlier, I was afraid of the people who were not the same color as me. Was this a part of my white privilege and/or my racism? Probably! I hope I have grown some from the person that I was. I think I have. Some people scare the hell out of me but it has nothing to do with their skin color. It is more about what is going on in their heads and hearts. It is about hurting others. It is about a lack of acceptance and a lack of love for each other. I know I am a work in progress. That I have a long ways to go and challenges up ahead. All I ask is your compassion and forgiveness for my transgressions along the way. I will continue to work to eliminate JUST THERE.
