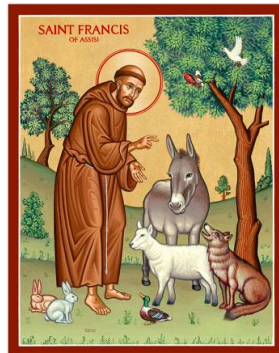

From the Rector

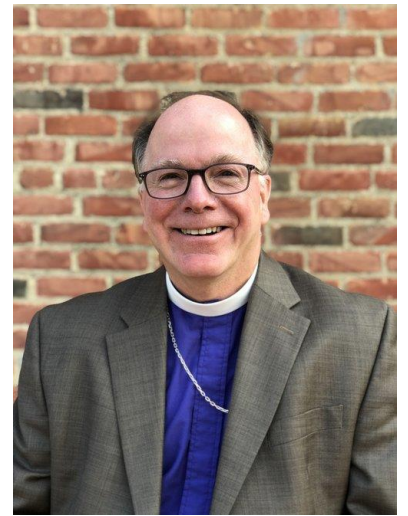


For many of us, our most faithful friends are our pets. Be they dogs, cats, birds, fish, gerbils, horses, bunnies, goats, snakes, frogs, or ferrets (*the list goes on*), our pets have been a lifeline during the pandemic—a conduit to and a reminder of the unconditional love of Christ which expresses itself in all creation. This year, in remembrance of St. Francis of Assisi, whose feast day was October 4, we will offer a live pet blessing and simple Holy Eucharist outdoors this Saturday October 10 at 4pm.

You can participate in the pet blessing and Holy Eucharist on the front lawn or directly from the security of your car. If you would like to receive communion and a pet blessing from your cars just pull into the circle drive in front of the church and roll down a window. If you don't have a pet to be blessed or would like to receive communion and/or pet blessing from the ground, just gather under the sweet gum trees as we normally do for our outdoor Eucharist. I will come to you to offer Holy Eucharist and bless your pet. If you would like a pet blessing but are uncomfortable bringing your pet with you, I would be happy to bless a photo of your pet, or say a prayer of thanksgiving for the pets who have enriched your life along the way but have passed on to their sure reward for a life lived in love and loyalty.

What Can I Do?

With all that's going on in the world, "What can I do?" is perhaps a question we all ask at one point or another. How can we contribute to change, help our neighbors, or express our faith in turbulent times? You can learn by taking ***The Basics of Faith-Based Public Advocacy***. Jubilee Garden

We've completed the first growing season of the Jubilee Garden and are thankful for all who helped, all that we learned during the year, and most importantly the blessings received by giving away lots of fresh produce to our Choice Food Pantry neighbors!

The Jubilee Garden Committee met via Zoom in the beginning of September to review the project and discuss plans for the garden in 2021. One item that was discussed and decided on, you probably have noticed! The decision was made to incorporate both in the soil crops as well as utilizing the raised beds we purchased this year. The hope is to expand the amount of crops we can grow, with the goal of feeding more people!

In preparation for next year, a tractor was brought in and the soil where the garden is located was tilled. Deer fencing options are being explored and the area will be fenced in this fall or early next spring.

Additionally, a survey was created for Pantry guests to ask their opinion on what crops they would like to see us grow (and that they will eventually eat!). As winter approaches we will continue to plan the layout of the 2021 garden and develop a planting schedule.

As the project grows we continue to look for volunteers and community partners. 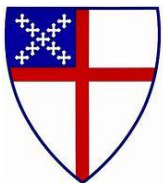
For All the Saints

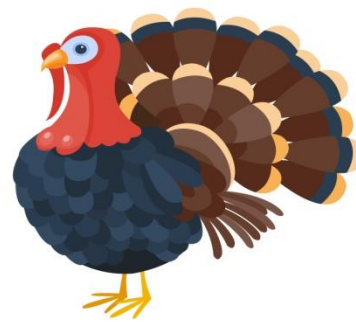
Why St. Francis?

Born in 1181, Giovanni di Pietro di Bernardone, known to us as St. Francis, was the son of a wealthy silk merchant from Assisi, Italy. Raised in great privilege, Francis embraced poverty as a young man after a spiritual encounter with a leper while on pilgrimage. Francis embraced poverty, penance, and self-giving as a means to grow closer to God in Christ and to do Christ's work in the world. The religious order Francis founded, the Franciscans, are known to this day for their simplicity of life and care for the poor.

Once Francis found Christ, he shared Christ's love with the world through his ministry of hands-on service and by preaching peace and sacrificial love. One story associated with Francis is that he loved all creatures, held them as sacred, and even preached to the birds! What better way to honor Francis' Christian witness than by blessing our pet companions in thanksgiving for the love and community we share together with our pets, each other, and all of creation. Join us on Saturday October 10 and give thanks for the pet companions who have enriched your life.

Bellwether's Buy 1 Give 1 Turkey Project ***Thanksgiving with the emphasis on giving!***

The Diocese of Ohio's Bellwether Farm is a real working farm - and this year in addition to sheep, pigs and chickens, they raised turkeys - which is where Thanksgiving come in! They have a limited number of farm-fresh turkeys available for the November holiday, and will be selling them as part of the 2020 farm-to-parish COVID-19 response initiative, ***Feeding the Beloved Community***. Since May, Bellwether has donated produce and pork to five parochial hot meal programs.

So let's talk turkey! Here's how it works: A contribution of \$100 (\$50 of which is tax-deductible) will cover two turkeys - one to enjoy with your family and one to be enjoyed in the hot meal programs we are supporting. There are 45 partnerships available on a first-come, first-serve basis.. Pick-up days will be Saturday, **November 21**; Monday, **November 23**; and Tuesday, **November 24**. Your turkey can either be fresh or freshly frozen.

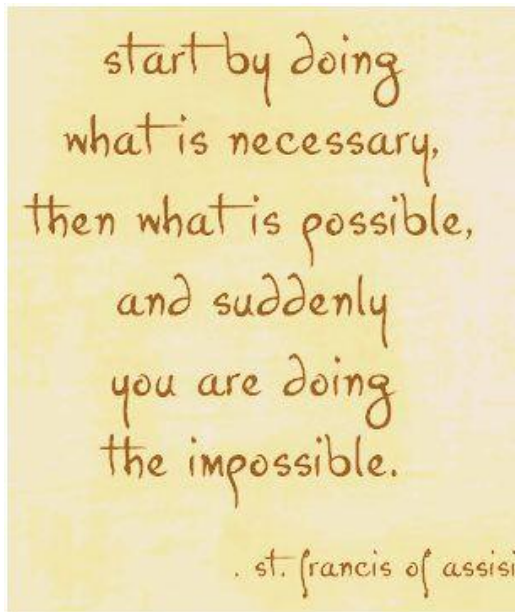
VOLUNTEER OPPORTUNITIES


